



Honey Pot works to enhance the lives of young carers and vulnerable children, aged 5 – 12 years old, and we are the only charity in the UK to provide respite breaks and on-going outreach support throughout a child's formative years. Honey Pot gives young carers a break from demanding and stressful responsibilities at home and provides a safe, nurturing environment where children at risk can develop their full potential.

The majority of children we support are young carers, who work incredibly hard to provide care and emotional support for a loved one. From as young as 5, young carers may be giving medication, completing chores, and assisting with personal care - taking on a surrogate parental role while still going to school. We also support vulnerable children, who may have witnessed domestic violence, experienced homelessness or live in extremely deprived areas.

Children come to Honey Pot House in the New Forest, Hampshire, or to Honey Pot Pen y Bryn, Mid-Wales, to take a break alongside their peers. Activities such as riding a bike, learning to swim, going on a trip to the beach are often experienced for the very first time. Most importantly, children have the chance to be children. They can play, make friends, and create memories to cherish for years to come.

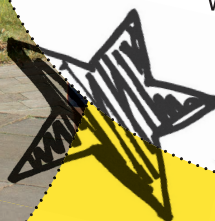
